An Act

To extend the time for conducting the referendum with respect to the national marketing quota for wheat for the marketing year beginning June 1, 1982.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled*, That the last sentence of section 336 of the Agricultural Adjustment Act of 1938 (7 U.S.C. 1336) is amended by striking out "October 15, 1981" and inserting in lieu thereof "November 15, 1981".

Wheat the United States as the world's largest producer and exporter of wheat has a key role to play in efforts to meet nations' needs for food and to improve their ability to feed themselves. Wheat is a major global food supply source and appears likely to continue to be a major world food supply source unless the level of world food production is significantly increased, and the means for the production of food and of the resources required for its production are improved. Wheat the world hunger problem is critical to the security of the United States and the international community. Wheat is a key recommendation of the Presidential Commission on World Hunger and that efforts be undertaken to increase public awareness of the world hunger problem and to assist the one hundred and forty-seven member nations of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations designated October 16, 1981 as "World Food Day" because of the need to alert the public to the increasingly dangerous world food situation. Now therefore be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled that the President is authorized and requested to issue a proclamation designating October 16, 1981 as "World Food Day", and calling upon the people of the United States to observe such day with appropriate activities.
